A message from Jesse L Schneirla, VA4WDA President

VA4WDA,

On 19-20 September, 2025 we came back together for the 31st running of the VA4WDA Fall Run after having to take a year off because of insurance issues. It wasn't because we couldn't secure insurance because of any past experience, it was because no one was writing insurance to cover our event. But with the hard work of Chad Thompson (VA4WDA Member at Large) and the owners of Oak Ridge Estate, we were able to secure insurance and hold the event. However, it came at a cost as the insurance quadrupled and that is the reason we had to go up on the price of the event. But we still try to make it as affordable as possible so it's not a strain on our members.

I want to also thank the Trail Guides and VA4WDA BOD members that came up to clear trails that haven't been maintained for two years. They all do this as volunteers and spend their own money and time to make this happen. We held three clean-up weekends to get the trails to where you could get through to enjoy the weekend. We lost count of how many trees had to be removed off the trails during those weekends. Also, they volunteer to set-up, tear down, safely guide for the weekend, recover vehicles off the trail and work hard at making this the best experience for those that attend this event. So if you see one of the above be sure to thank them for their efforts to make this event happen. We did finally sell out, but those that got a ticket had a great weekend. VA4WDA uses this as a membership drive event. Doing so we went from 350 paid members to over 600 paid members. So we did accomplish what we set out to do. Remember there is strength in numbers.

We had a great weather weekend as everyone rolled in on Thursday to complete registration and then headed to pick out a spot to camp for the weekend. It was great to drive around and meet those that were new to the event and those that come every year. For some, this is the only wheeling event that they attend all year.

We staged out Friday and Saturday morning to hit the trails to enjoy the day, making memories and experiencing those events that turn into tales that start out like this: "That one year at the VA4WDA Fall Run at Oak Ridge Estate...." I'm sure there are plenty of those stories that were told each night at the campfires while visiting with fellow wheelers. Tidewater Fourwheelers 50th Anniversary Campout

Members of Tidewater Fourwheelers held their 50th Anniversary Campout at the George Washington National Forest on October 25 and 26. Base camp was set at Stokesville Campground (http://stokesvillecampground.com/) with most members arriving Friday

evening as temperatures began to tumble. The campground offers tents, cabins, and RV sites.



A cold Saturday morning started with a meet up at the Stokesville gas station. After gassing up and last minute groceries, we rolled out for a day of trail riding. Heading to Reddish Knob on a back road trail, one XJ had an electrical gremlin pop up. After scratching our heads and chasing wires, the Jeep was mobile. The consensus was to get it back to camp before a complete failure. The remaining group rolled on, climbing in elevation to 4,396 feet at Reddish Knob. The parking lot was full but we managed to find spaces with a group of trucks leaving. Lunch was called, coolers unloaded, and a drone was sent into the air.

After lunch, the group resumed down the trail in the direction of Flagpole

Knob. It was a dusty, bumpy ride with the occasional oncoming vehicle traffic. We were greeted at the overlook with a beautiful view at 4,360 ft in elevation, even with a pull behind camper boondocking on the mound.

The area was busy with

groups coming and going, and with the day getting short, we exited off the mountain by heading down Switzer Lake Road. We met several oncoming groups that were heading up for a primitive camping experience Saturday night. After airing up the tires by Switzer Lake, we all settled in for a 25 minute return ride on back roads to Stokesville Campground.

Rolling into camp at dusk, it was time to relax, fire up the grills for dinner, and light up the campfire for an evening of reminiscing of the years gone bye with some of our senior members in attendance.

Sunday morning we woke to a cloud deck moving over the sunrise. It was time to pack up and hit the road. Some members stayed behind to spend another day on the trail while most headed home. Thank you to all who attended this anniversary trip! Looking forward to the next one.





Association Member Capital City Four Wheelers got some great recognition for their fundraising efforts. Article was written by Joy Christ with the Island Free Press.

The Capital City Four Wheelers' 40th Annual Surf Fishing Tournament brought hundreds of anglers and families to Hatteras Island on Oct. 18 and 19 — and by the end of the weekend, the long-running event had raised \$7,000 to support four local foster families through the St. John United Women in Faith Foster Family Committee

The funds came entirely from a raffle of four custom rod-and-reel combinations built and donated by noted craftsmen: Tommy Farmer of Carolina Cast Pro, Joe Moore of One More Cast, Ryan White of Hatteras Jack's Bait and Tackle, and Michael Harris of Full Send Rod Company. Tournament chair Heather Vaughan said participation and generosity were both at a high point this year.

"This was hands down the best tournament," Vaughan said. "We had all of our fish categories filled up, even the children's tournament, which we take to five



places now. Surf or Sound Realty gives us a big donation that helps fund that. And then our anglers showed up big time on the raffle this year. We had four different builders build rods for us, and it paid off."

With 586 registered anglers and two clear fishing days following a storm earlier in the week, Vaughan said the turnout was one of the strongest in recent memory. "It was amazing," she said. "People were just tired of the weather and wanted to get out and fish."

And when it was announced that raffle proceeds would benefit local foster families, the crowd responded with enthusiasm. "People bought 20 tickets, or \$300 worth of tickets," said Vaughan. "All of the anglers wanted to help the local community."

The St. John United Women in Faith Foster Family Committee was chosen as the recipient of the raffle funds after word spread about the group's work with foster families on Hatteras Island. Committee member Teresa Hudgins Black said the need is ongoing and often unseen.

"We have four foster families, and [money] just doesn't stretch far enough," said Black. "Our greatest mission is to help women and children in need, and we just felt in our hearts that we really needed to do something."

The Capital City Four Wheelers, a Richmond-based surf fishing club that has held its annual Hatteras tournament for four decades, has built a reputation for supporting local causes each year. Past donations have gone to a local firefighter whose home burned down, to a local woman who lost her car, to the Cape Hatteras Secondary School drama department, and regularly to the Cape Hatteras United Methodist Men's food bank.

Vaughan said those choices often come through "word of mouth" — a simple network of island residents and longtime friends who help identify where the need is greatest. "All the dollars from our raffle donations stay right here," she said. "Everything we make

from the tournament — we donate it back. Some things go to Richmond, but most stay local: to the United Methodist Men for the food bank here, to the fire departments, and other things. We have a few eyes and ears on the island who tell us where the biggest need is each year, and that's where we try to help."

This year's milestone 40th tournament also included more than 295 door prizes donated by local and Richmond-area businesses, a children's tournament sponsored by Surf or Sound Realty, and seven fish categories — red drum, bluefish, trout, croaker, spot, sea mullet, and northern puffer — with first and second place awards in each. The group even kept up its annual "trash rod contest," where participants earn a chance at a \$100 rod-and-reel combo by collecting debris from the beach, a prize donated this year by Dillon's Corner

For Vaughan and her team, the success of this year's event wasn't just about good weather or great catches — it was about the community spirit that continues to tie Hatteras Island and the Capital City Four Wheelers together after decades of fishing.

"It's been 40 years, and we've never missed a tournament — even in 2020," she said. "Every year, it's the same reason we come back: good fishing, good people, and supporting a good cause."
