Carolla Wild Horse Rules & Regulations & Corolla Wild Horse Fund

Currituck County Ordinances, NC Laws, and Federal Laws

The Wild Horse Ordinance of Currituck County says, among other things, that feeding the wild horses or getting within 50 feet of them is punishable by law. The laws are designed to ensure their safety and well-being.

Here's a more detailed breakdown:

- 1. Distance: It is illegal and dangerous to approach the horses closer than 50 feet, according to CWHF. This rule applies even if the horses approach you. The 50-foot rule is in place to protect both humans and horses.
- 2. Feeding: Never feed the wild horses. Their digestive systems are not adapted to human food, and even seemingly harmless items like apples and carrots can be deadly. Feeding the horses can also lead to them becoming habituated to humans, potentially leading to their removal from the wild.
- 3. Harassment and Harm: It is illegal to harass, entice, or attempt to touch the wild horses. This includes actions like attempting to ride them, lure them with food, or otherwise interfere with their natural behavior.
- 4. Other important rules and considerations:
 Use a 4-wheel drive vehicle. To access the beaches where the horses roam, a 4-wheel drive vehicle is necessary, and it's recommended to air down the tires. Believe it or not there is a speed limit on the beach. Please obey it.

Observe from a distance: Use binoculars or a camera with a zoom lens to enjoy the horses without disturbing them.



Respect their space: The horses are wild animals and should be treated with respect. Avoid any actions that could cause them stress or fear. Like blowing your horn/air horns at them or revving your loud motors to scare them.

Report injuries: If you see an injured horse, report it to the authorities and the Corolla Wild Horse Fund.

Be aware of your surroundings: Pay attention to where the horses are and their behavior. If they approach you, calmly move away to maintain the 50-foot distance.

Consequences of Violations: Violations of the wild horse ordinance can result in citations and fines. The Corolla Wild Horse Fund and local authorities have a zero-tolerance policy for those who endanger the horses.

Fines & Court Appearance: Violating this ordinance can result in a maximum fine of \$500 and may require a mandatory court appearance.

Increased Enforcement: The Currituck County Sheriff's Office has adopted a "no warning" policy, issuing citations directly to those caught violating the horse ordinance.

Please be a Good Steward of the off road community and help protect the wild horses that roam the beach. By following these rules and regulations, you can help ensure the safety and well-being of the Corolla wild horses for years to come.

Scrambler Owners' Association National Event 2025

In June, I attended the Scrambler Owners' Associations Annual Event in Evarts, Kentucky. That's near Harlan, if you're trying to find it on a map. The event was held at the Black Mountain Off-road Park. First, if you're not aware of what a Scrambler is, it's a Jeep model made in the 1980's (1981-1986) that's basically an extended CJ-7. They didn't build a lot of them and they were actually, pretty much, a failure for Jeep back in the day, but they're in demand and unique these days. Virginia had the most Scramblers there with 7 out of about 40 Scramblers there from all over the country. They

ranged from some beautiful restored, original and restomods to totally modified in every way. I fall somewhere in the restomod category. We run the trails and go see some local sites for 3 days, have group meals and a raffle on the last night. I'm usually able to attend events and not have to lift my hood to work on anything. Typically, it's unload off the trailer, run everything, load it up and go home....not this time. I just



put a new motor in my Scrambler, another AMC 360, with a few more upgrades than the last one. So I knew that I'd be working out a few bugs, but not as many as I seemed to find. My GRMS radio didn't have power (I had 2 handhelds that worked), my lockers wouldn't come on (bad relay), my power steering fluid all leaked out on night (loose fitting at the steering box), had death wobble for the first time ever (bad ball joints, now replaced), blew out my lower steering column bearing (fixed now) and some temperature readings for the new motor that kept me stressed out a bit. Plus a few more minor things.

Still, I was able to run trails and do some sightseeing in the area. I've been to this park before, many years ago. I have to say that it didn't seem as well maintained as it was the last time that I was there, I hope it was just an off week for them. The trails are good with a lot of variety for whatever difficulty level you might be looking for. I kept it on the moderate level. One morning I headed out with a small group in a hurry and quickly found out that airing down shouldn't be skipped. Also managed to sort out my lockers after doing a steep climb without them, luckily someone else had a relay for me when we figured out that it was bad. The rest of that that day went a lot better after that.

Overall, it was good trip with a lot of great friends at the event, some that I only get to see once a year. Va4WDA member and Vice President of the SOA, Jake Everly, won



the top raffle prize of a portable, battery powered welder...so if you need some welding. Dustin Bryant seemed to win a bunch of stuff too.

Message from Ben Wood and Mel Wood, President of Tidewater Fourwheelers and Secretary for VA4WDA, respectively!



This one below was a favorite of Sandy Schneirla, our Vice President and business member!

Pineapple upside down cake

Credit given to the great American outdoors cookbook 1 16ounce can of sliced pineapple 2 tablespoons margarine One jar, maraschino cherries 1/2 cup packed brown sugar One package yellow cake mix

Drain pineapple, reserving the juice. Line Dutch oven with foil. Grease foil with margarine. Arrange pineapple and cherries on foil. Sprinkle brown sugar and 3 tablespoons of reserved juice over fruit. Prepare cake mix using package directions. Pour prepared cake mix over fruit. Place cover on Dutch oven. Place 1 inch above hot coals. Top with hot coals. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until Cake tests done. Cool for 10 minutes. Convert onto platter. Peel off foil. Enjoy!

Pepper Brats

Adjust ingredients slightly based on number of folks eating. Makes a great lunch. This recipe can feed 12! 3 packs of your favorite Brats
Green Chile
3 Onions, 3 yellow peppers, 3 orange peppers, sliced
Seasoning - your choice! (garlic, pepper, salt, cajun spices, get creative)
Large flat buns

Heat the oil or butter in the disk (Never use more heat than you need!! Add Brats and brown - for crisper veggies cook brats till nearly done. Add Onions, Peppers, Chile and seasoning. Mix until done. Serve on flat buns with what you like! Serve with mustard or ketchup.
